Chief Deputy



Colonel Carlos Stout began his law enforcement career with the Lafayette Parish Sheriff's Office in 1990 as a corrections deputy. He then went on to work at the Lafayette Airport, on the Lafayette Metro Street Unit as an undercover detective and as a patrol supervisor. He left the Lafayette Sheriff's Office in 2001 to run for Chief of Police in the community of Carencro. In 2002, he was elected as the Carencro Chief of Police and went on to win four re-elections.

Colonel Stout has also served as President of the Louisiana Association of Chiefs of Police, Louisiana Attorney General Command College, and the President of the Southwest Louisiana Chiefs of Police. Colonel Stout was also appointed by multiple Louisiana Governors to serve on the Council of Peace Officers Standards Training, Louisiana Commission on Law Enforcement, Louisiana Violent Crime and Narcotics Task Force, Drug Control and Violent Crime Policy Board and the Louisiana Domestic Violence Board.

Colonel Stout rejoined the Lafayette Parish Sheriff's Office in 2016 after being selected by Sheriff Mark Garber to serve as his Chief Deputy.

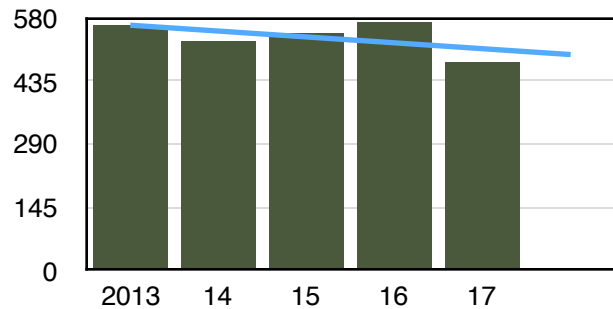

The sheriff's uniformed patrol division responded to 475 crashes in 2017. Of the 475 crashes worked, 84 reported injuries. We had no fatalities.

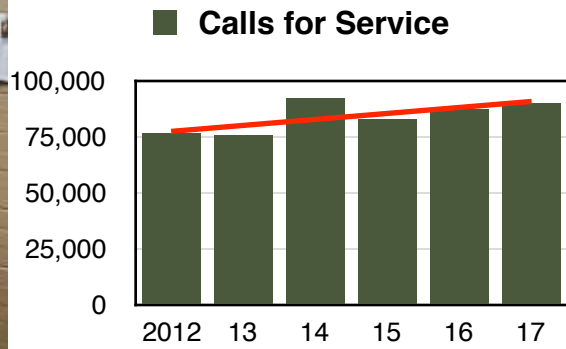

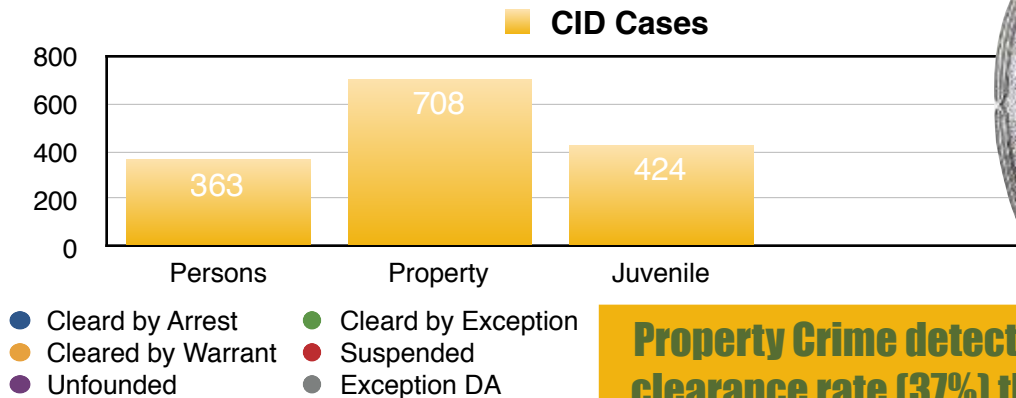


Calls for service have increased by 13,527 since 2012

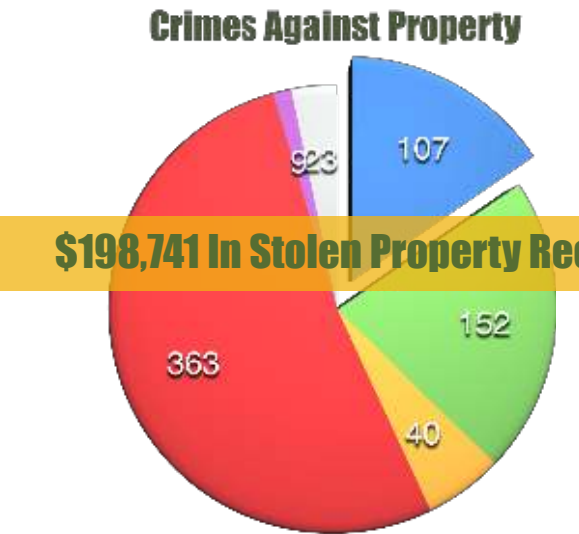

Property Crime detectives have a clearance rate (37%) that is twice the national average (18.3%)

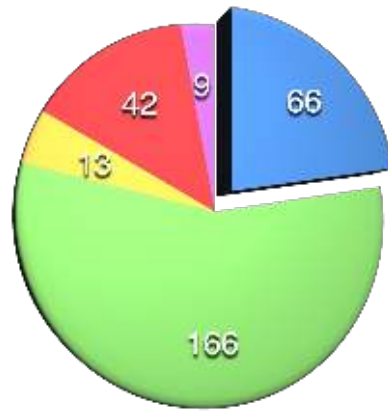

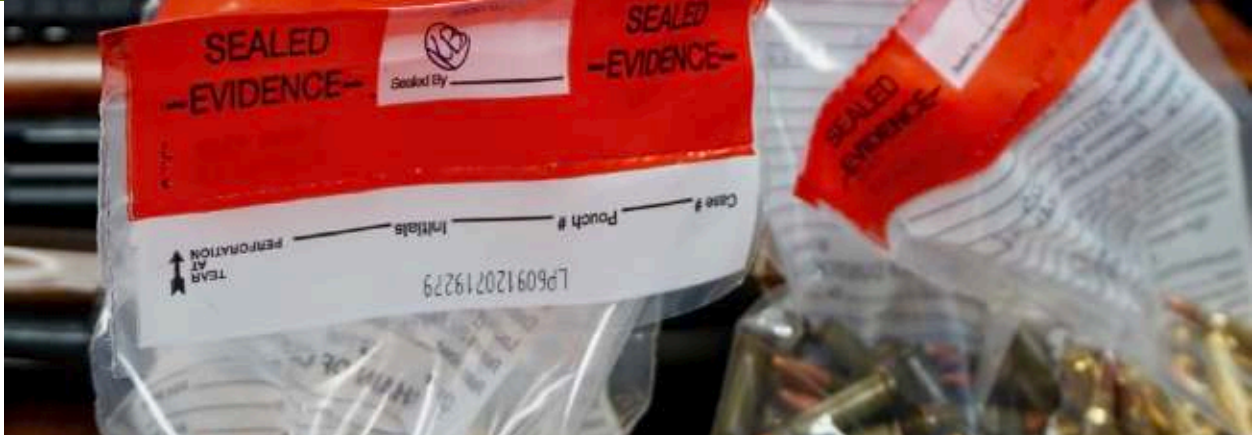
Recovery Trends

While recovery of Crack Cocaine has dropped, recovery of other narcotics have increased.

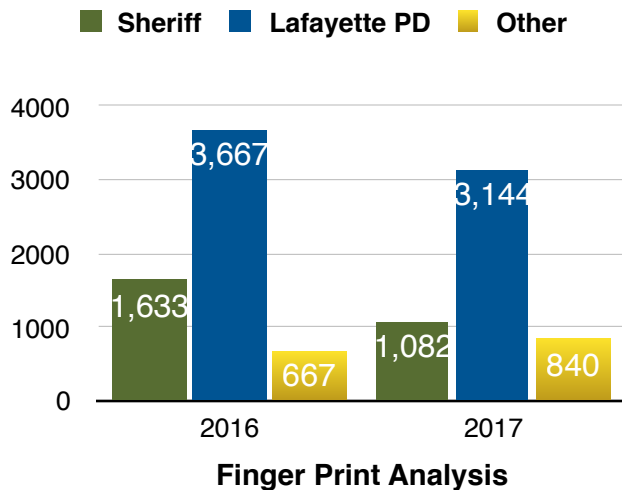
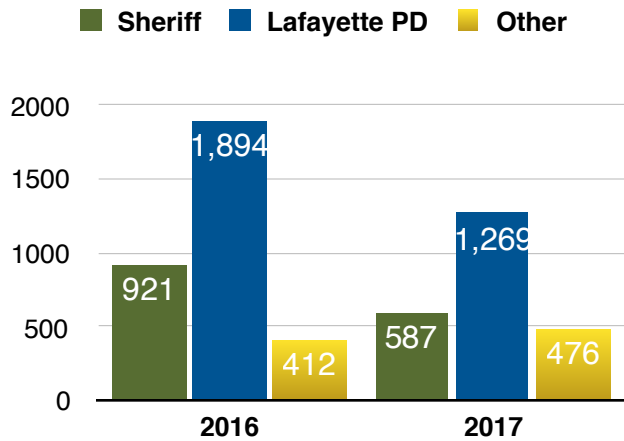
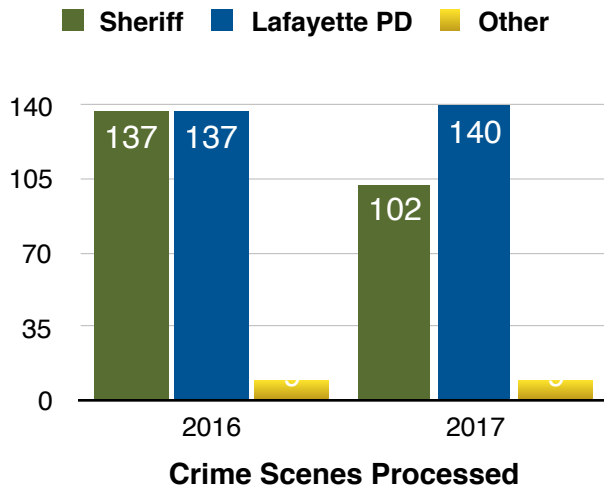

The Support Services Division supports the Sheriff's mission by developing and utilizing the resources necessary to advance law enforcement objectives and department goals through cost effective and innovative activities.

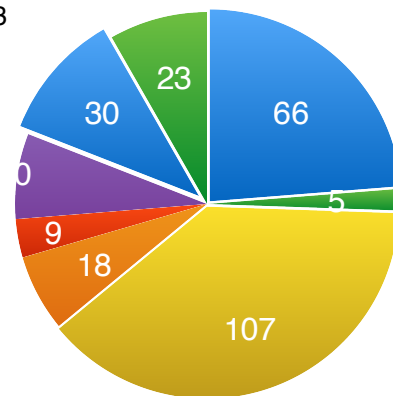
Information Systems

The Information System Section is the Sheriff's technological hub behind operations. The IS Section is tasked with maintaining the hardware, software and infrastructure for various law enforcement technology systems to include support of over 1100 computer, 1100 software applications, 21 operating systems and 27 databases.

Special Weapons And Tactics



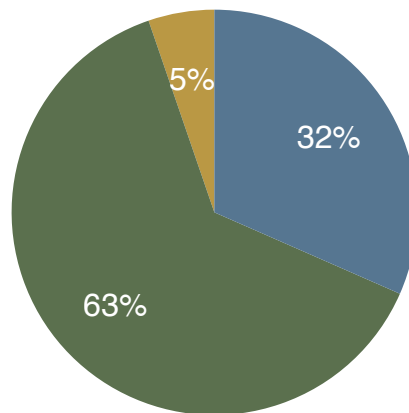
In 2017, Sheriff Mark Garber ordered the complete reorganization of the Special Response Team (SRT) and changed the name back to Special Weapons And Tactics (SWAT). The reorganization resulted in stricter assessments, harder selection and allowed for the modernization of training, tactics and equipment. It also provided a roadmap for a full time SWAT team that serves as a quick reaction force. This innovative approach ensures the availability of highly trained SWAT officers to serve the public and schools.

September 2017: Sheriff Mark Garber authorized the consolidation of resources capable of performing search and rescue functions. These resources include boats, divers, high water vehicles and aviation assets. The sheriff also authorized the organization of the SAR team in a manner that will allow it to be both self sufficient and expandable to include members from outside agencies who posses specialized skills.

The Lafayette Sheriff's Office operates the Acadiana Law Enforcement Training Academy from its training center on Willow Street.

In 2017, the sheriff's training division hosted four academies and graduated 115 students out of 143 candidates. These students became POST (Peace Officer Standards Training) certified and went on to serve in 25 law enforcement agencies throughout the state.

The Sheriff's Office also hosted a reserve academy so that reservists could meet Sheriff Garber's mandate requiring all officers to be fully certified. The Reserve Academy required extreme dedication by those who attended.

2017 marked the first year the Lafayette Parish Sheriff's Office Range has been fully operational since 2013. Upgrades to the range allowed training staff to take advantage of every feature the facility has to offer. Instructors educated students on various aspects of firearms training to include, fundamentals and advanced techniques for pistols and patrol rifles.

Open to the Public!

Sheriff Mark Garber was proud to announce range availability to the public. The shooting range is open to the public on the second Saturday of every month under the supervision of qualified range safety officers. The Sheriff's Office also supplies instructors and supplies for Hunters Safety Training in cooperation with the Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries.

In 2017, the sheriff's office hosted three training opportunities to the public and had participation by 111 attendees.

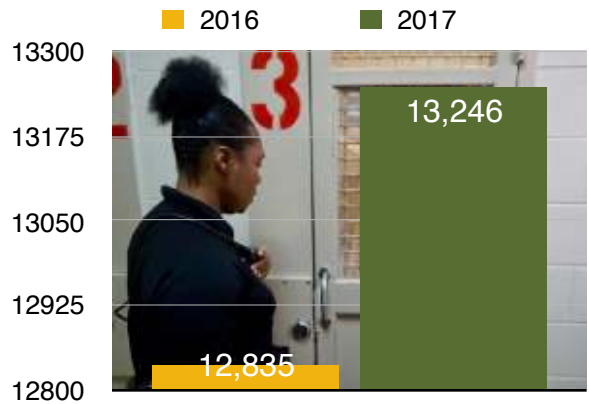

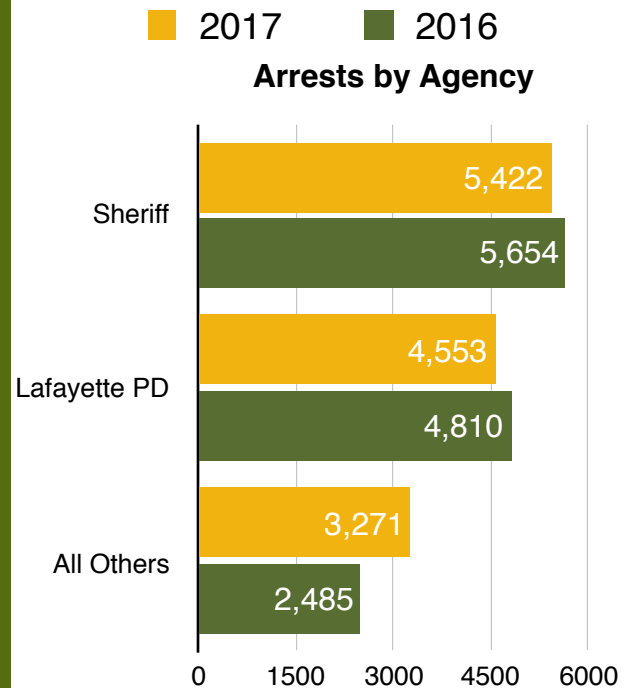

Despite an increase in booking, the average daily population of LPCC decreased from 845 in 2016 to 823 in 2017. This was caused by the transfer of eligible inmates to the Direct Supervision Unit and Transitional Work Program.

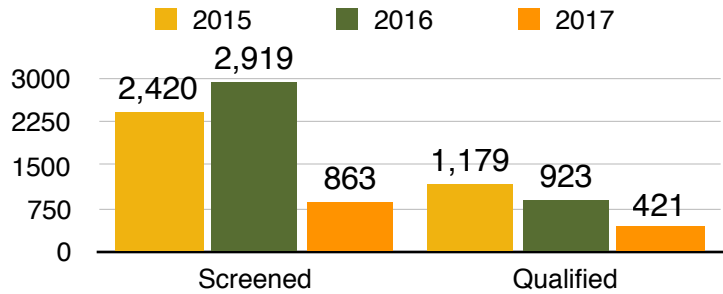
The Sheriff's farm harvested 85,000 pounds of produce in 2017. That helped reduce the cost tax payers are paying for inmate meals.

Sheriff's Tracking Offender Program (STOP)



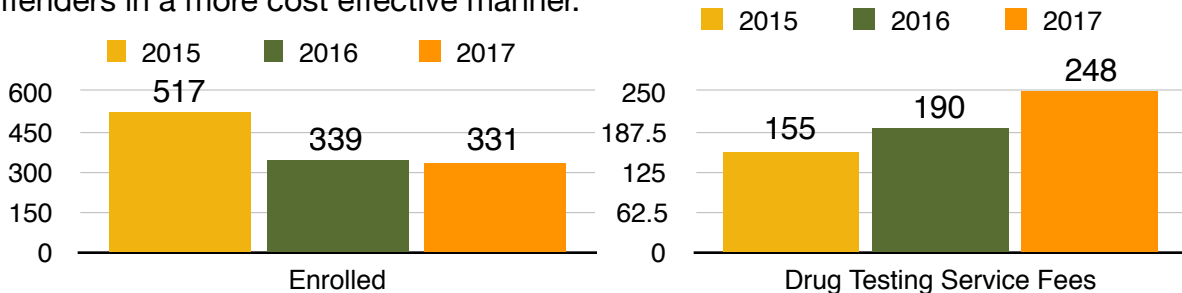
STOP screens offenders to determine eligibility for pretrial diversion and other in-house programming.

1,769 offenders were pre-assessed by STOP in 2017 for eligibility in our diversion programs. The decrease in participation was caused by stricter qualification guidelines that prevent individuals with weapons charges from participating.



Alternative Sentencing Programs

ASP diverts qualified offenders from incarceration in LPCC and places them under the supervision of Community Corrections. Due to the high cost of incarceration, ASP uses drug testing, GPS monitoring and other rehabilitative programs to track offenders in a more cost effective manner.

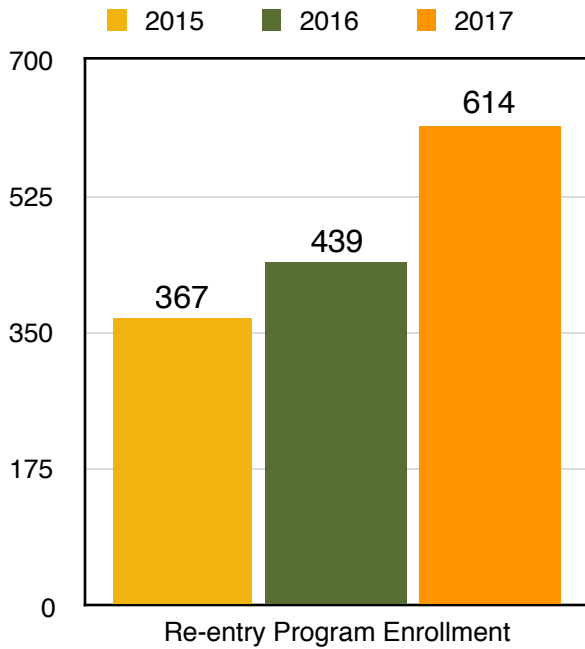

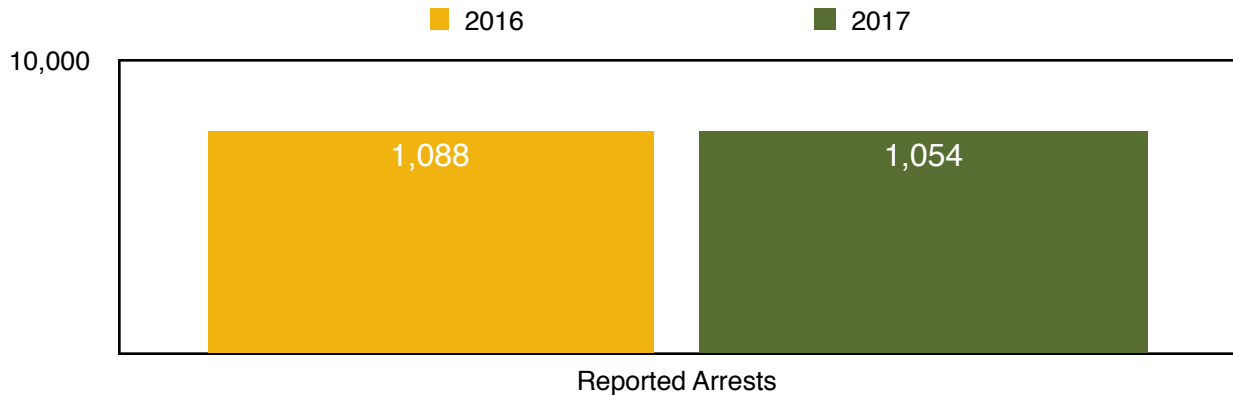

Youth Services

The Juvenile Assessment Center (JAC) serves as the hub through which most juveniles arrested by any agency within the parish are processed. These juveniles are supervised by case managers and mental health professionals as they participate in programs designed to help correct their behavior. Teen Intervene, Milestones and Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CBT) are three of the programs used to care for the needs of juveniles.



Reported Arrests

The Lafayette Sheriff's Office Check and Connect Staff host a three week summer camp for both middle and high school aged kids. This camp is free to local children and is designed to keep them physically active and engaged during the summer break. Approximately 100 children attended the camp last year where they developed social skills and participated in many activities.



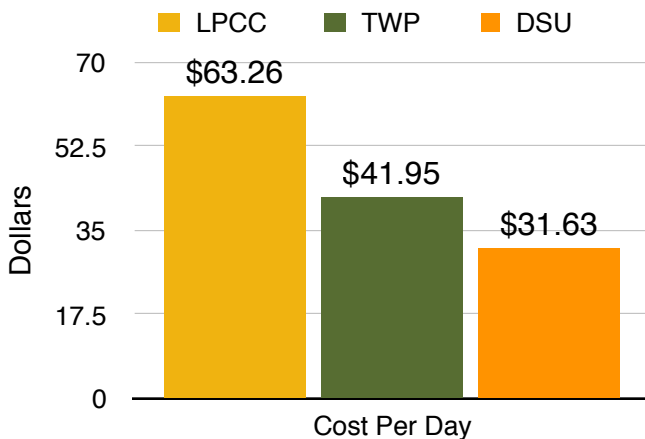
Alternative Programming



The Direct Supervision Unit (DSU) houses inmates currently enrolled in Reentry programs which receive life skills, religious and educational programming.



The Transitional Work Program provides offenders with an opportunity to work, provide for their families and continue meeting their obligations. Since 2004, over 5,000 offenders have been employed by 500 area businesses.

Tax payers benefit from proper inmate classification. When offenders are classified correctly, they can be placed in areas that allow us to maximize the use of tax payer money and help them receive the services they need.

Inmate Industries

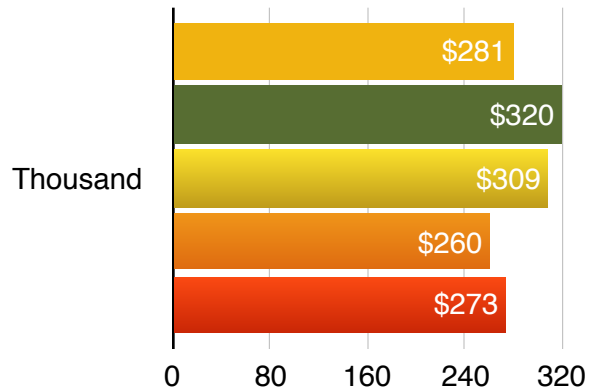
It is the goal of Inmate Industries to keep offenders busy while teaching them marketable skills. It also provides cost effective labor to local government and non-profit organizations and helps save tax payers money by offsetting the cost of incarceration.

Inmate Industries	
LAPCORR	Is a jail industry that manufactures and sells items made by offenders to any government or non-profit organizations.
Outside Work Crews	Provide labor services to the sheriff's office, local government and non-profit organizations.
Central Laundry	Washes an average of 1,500 pounds of inmate laundry each day.
Farm Services	Grows twenty one types of produce totaling 85,000 pounds annually. This produce is used to feed inmates and helps reduce the daily cost of incarceration by approximately \$99,000 a year.

LAPCORR generated over \$281K in income with the sale of cardboard boxes, mattresses, mattress covers, trash can liners, pet beds, shower curtains, window covers and air filters.



In 2017 Outside Work Crews donated 585 hours of work on community service related projects like picking up barricades and trash after Mardi Gras.

These work crews provide a valuable resource to local government and non profit organizations.

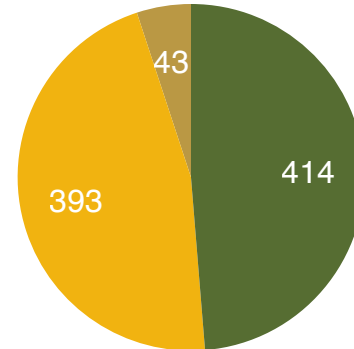

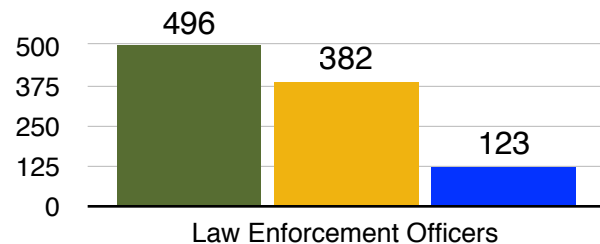

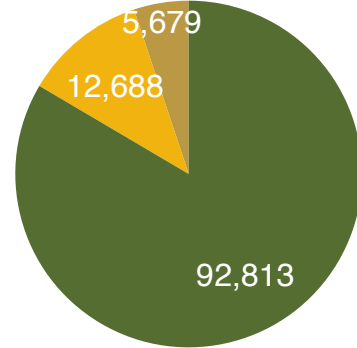
Administrative Services Division

In 2017, the civil department served 111,189 legal documents. They averaged 9,265 documents per month (down from 10,600 in 2016).

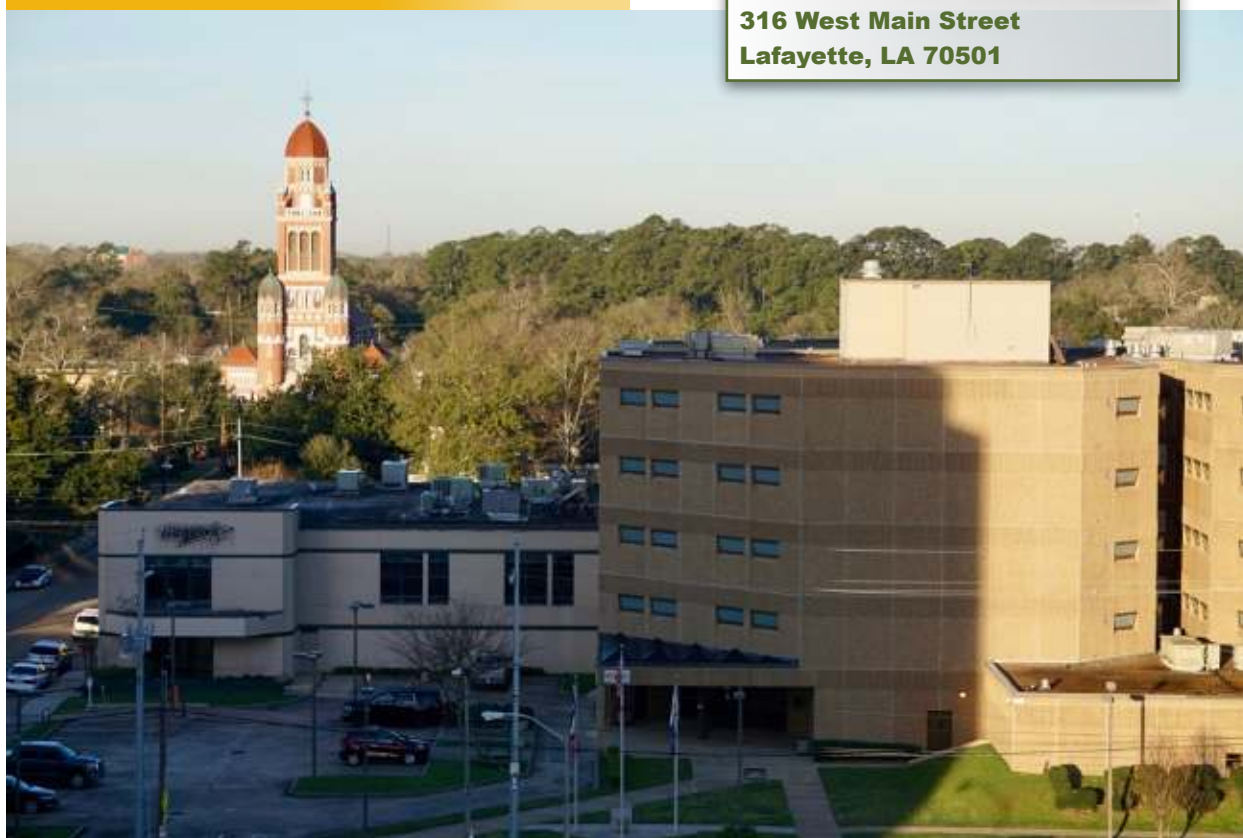
